Firstly, thank you to the hundreds of parents/carers who have already signed up to our new app. For those who are unaware, we have introduced School Gateway to LSCC – this is a parental engagement app that will allow you to communicate with, and receive communications from the school easily, anytime from anywhere.

All school related communication, newsletters, attendance tracking etc will go through School Gateway – in the short term, we will continue to use several streams to do this, but we aim to be using School Gateway as the main communications route by March. In the Spotlight... Sporting Success at Liskeard

School sport is back and we have been very active this year, offering opportunities to large numbers of students to represent the school in a wide variety of sports.

In January alone, we have had over 50 students represent Liskeard at the Cornwall School Games Qualifier, competing in dodgeball and functional fitness; resulting in three 1st places (in the year 7/8 dodgeball, 7/8 & 9/10 functional fitness) and a 2nd place in the 7/8 functional fitness. These teams have now qualified for the next round of the games later in the year.

The boys' and girls' hockey teams have played in the County tournament and showed great resilience in their performance. The U13 boys finishing 5th in the County and the girls finishing 2nd. The girls now get to represent Cornwall in the Regional finals in Millfield later in the term.

We took part in the Panathlon event, which aims to give opportunity to students with additional needs. Most recently, we competed in the boccia tournament and finished in 1st and 2nd place!

At school, the PE department are offering students the chance to experience different sports as part of our extra-curricular offer. Aerial ropes' club has taken flight with the students and we are proud of the students for showing courage in trying something new.

English Speaking Board Qualifications

Students across Year 7 worked extremely hard before the Christmas holidays on their English Speaking Board exams. This was something brand new for Liskeard School and Year 7 were the first year group to go through the process. Students were placed in groups and asked to choose a poem and write a story. They were then given lesson time in both English and Drama to memorise their material plus a short introduction to both and create a performance to highlight their eloquence and articulation when speaking. The entire exam lasted almost twenty minutes for each group - speaking from memory for that long is no mean feat! As a year group, they really are to be commended as every single student passed the exam with some even achieving a merit or a merit plus (a very difficult level to achieve).

However, in the spirit of ESB, it is only appropriate to hear the students' voice: "Looking back at ESB we found it enjoyable. We each had to memorise a part of the story and the poem that we chose so that we could perform in front of the examiner. To decide what story and poem we did we practised our argument skills and did a vote to make sure it was fair. We found working in a group really fun as we each pulled our weight and split up the workload. We also enjoyed having a small break from writing because we got to use different techniques and skills. At the start of the exam, we found it quite a nerve-wracking experience as we didn't know who the examiner was going to be. Lucky for us, Trevor (the examiner) was really lovely, kind and helpful and supported us throughout, meaning our nerves quickly went away. Our advice for any future ESB students would be: don't worry about performing, as the examiners







are really supportive and make it very difficult to fail. As long as you work hard, learn your lines and go in with a smile you will be amazing!" - 7E

"We were all really nervous for the 6th of December as this was the day of our ESB exam. However, when we met Trevor (the examiner) all our nerves dissolved. We had to perform our story and poem with very strict timings, we couldn't be over and we couldn't be under. Despite the nerves, we were also excited as we were the first group to go through the exam, this actually helped our nerves as we got it over with first. After we walked out, everyone felt exhilarated and like they had conquered a massive challenge. Miss Hammond was really supportive as were the other members of our group. Although we did find it a bit of a challenge working in a big group because everyone works in different ways and we had never worked in groups of this size before. This was made more difficult because of Covid and various people were often missing, however we pulled together as a group and showed our resilience to overcome these obstacles. Our advice for future students doing the ESB exam would be to never give up, try your best, and believe in yourself as you never know what you can achieve." - 7L



Words of the Week 2021 - 2022

For a while now, we have been looking to develop a genuinely coherent approach to building students' range of vocabulary. A wide knowledge of vocabulary improves all areas of communication – listening, speaking, reading and writing.

Our Tutor programme for 2021 – 2022 includes two sessions of 'Words of the Week' each month. Each session presents three words, with definitions and activities to use them in context. Introducing our students to challenging words can help to improve their confidence to use increasingly sophisticated language in their speech and in writing.

The 'Words of the Week' activity identifies words which can be used across all subjects (known as Tier 2 words) as well as more subject specific vocabulary (known as Tier 3 words). Where it is possible, the Cornish translation is also included.

We would like to encourage the wide use of the Words of the Week outside of the classroom. Here are a few ways to get them talking:

- Have conversations about the school day, lessons, clubs, funny moments, reactions, feelings.
- Play word games, for example use the Words of the Week to create a short fictional story.
- Play 'one little word' where one person chooses a special word, (or one of the Words of the Week) gives a definition, explains or describes why it is special.
- Play 'Half a minute' where a topic is chosen, and each player must talk on that topic for 30 seconds without repetition, try to include one or more 'Words of the Week'
- Ask your child/children to talk about books they are reading at school and at home, and to give their opinion using key terminology they would use in lessons.
- Take a few minutes to look out of a window and talk about what is going on and what you
 can see.
- Ask your child/children to tell you the Words of the Week and how they have used them at school or elsewhere.


