Head's Letter

Dear Parents, Carers, Students and Friends of Liskeard School,

With the Easter holidays getting in the way, it feels like it's been a while since the last edition of The Reflection. Once again we have much to celebrate, including individual achievements and some articles about what's being going on in the school.

I'd also like to share with you the results of our recent parent survey. We had our biggest ever response, with around 300 parents feeding back to us. Overleaf are the results alongside the results to the previous survey so you can see how we compare. Whilst there is always room for improvement, the results are really pleasing. To put it into context, 85% of parents recommending the school to others is considered 'outstanding' by national benchmarks. You'll notice that not all the results will add up to 100% - this is



because some parents were unable to answer or because they gave a neutral response. A classic example is the question about bullying. If a child hasn't experienced bullying, then a parent may not feel able to give a response either way.

Alongside the results we received several comments. Over 130 of you wrote some really positive things about the school in general or specifically about the leadership of the school or individual members of staff - we really appreciate your kind words as they mean a great deal to us. We also had a few suggestions and a small number of criticisms. The two areas raised as an issue by more than four parents were in relation to communication and issuing too many detentions. In terms of communication, if you have left a non-urgent message or sent an email, our policy is to get back to you within 48 hours. If this does not happen, please let me know directly, so I can chase it up. In terms of detentions, whilst we don't ever want to issue a sanction, they are an essential part of our behaviour policy to ensure the high standards we expect in school are maintained. A number of detentions set have been for missed homework and lateness to school. Please ensure your child arrives to school by 8.45am and that you support them by checking Show my Homework for any homework set. We do though believe in the power of praise which is why we issue 4 times more merits than we do behaviour points.

Since I was last in touch, we have said farewell to some of our support staff who have either retired or moved on to new roles elsewhere (Ms Carlin, Ms Chinn, Mr Kempsell, Mr Sleeman, Ms Squire). I'd like to take this opportunity to thank them for all they have done for the school, especially Ms Carlin and Ms Chinn who have been with us for many years, and to wish them all our very best.

The popularity of the school continues. We have over 220 students joining us in September from primary school which means we will be oversubscribed in virtually every year group. The transition process for Year 6s is underway and we look forward to them visiting us later this term.

I'd like to finish by wishing our exam students (particularly Year 11 and 13) all the very best over the next few weeks. Many of them have been working incredibly hard and they have a long exam season ahead of them (GCSE exams are spread out over 5 weeks this year). The students' overall attitude and approach has been amazing. Given what has happened over the last two years and the prolonged uncertainty surrounding exams, they have shown huge amounts of resilience, for which they deserve recognition.

Important Information and Updates

Attendance – Important Notices for Parents and Carers

If your child is absent from school, please can you call the school every day of their absence before 9.15am. Please leave a message detailing why specifically they are unable to attend.

Please can we also ask you to let us know of any medical/orthodontist appointments in advance. This helps save us having to make an unnecessary phone calls home.

Please note:

If your child is absent from school without authorisation, you will be committing an offence under the Education Act 1996. We may submit a request to Cornwall Council for a Penalty Notice to be issued, in accordance with Sections 444A and 444B of the said Act. Penalty Notices are issued per liable parent, per child and each carry a fine of £60 if paid within 21 days or £120 if paid after this but within 28 days. Failure to pay the Penalty Notice may result in legal action. Absence not authorised by the school may result in a prosecution in the Magistrates' Court under Section 444(1) or Section 444(1A) of the Education Act 1996, leading to a fine of up to £2,500 and/or a custodial sentence. Cornwall Council may also apply for the costs incurred in taking the matter to Court.

In the Spotlight... Liskeard Trio Taking on an Ultra-marathon for Ukraine

Mr Lingard, Mr Pickles and former Deputy Head, Mr O'Connell will each be attempting to complete the whole of the South-West Traverse on Sunday 29th May - a 45 mile ultra-marathon along the coastal path from the Lizard to Land's End. The terrain is difficult and the course covers a total elevation of 5750 feet (that's almost one and half times the height of Ben Nevis). In Team Liskeard style it will require a lot of courage and resilience. The trio also wanted to embrace the school's focus on kindness by raising money for two charities chosen by our student council - The British Red Cross and ShelterBox - both currently working directly with Ukrainian refugees.



The British Red Cross believe in the power of kindness and have been helping people in crisis for over 150 years. ShelterBox, based in Cornwall, provide shelter, essential items and technical assistance to help some of the world's most vulnerable people recover and rebuild their homes.

Rugby Success For Former Liskeard Student

Former Liskeard School and Community College student Merryn Doidge, who plays as Exeter Chiefs fullback has been selected to play in the England 7s.

Merryn started her rugby career at Liskeard-Looe alongside her brother, before moving to Newquay Queen Bees U15s at the age of 12. Throughout her time at school Merryn excelled in all sports and was captian of our girls' rugby team.

Keen to develop her career within the game, she moved to Exeter to attend Exeter College, where she captained the side in her second year. She was also selected for Cornwall and England U18s the same year.

Merryn has since progressed through the age groups, representing England U20s and the National Academy side against the USA and Canada, and prior to joining the Exeter Chiefs she played in the Premier 15s for nearby rivals Bristol Bears.

Following an impressive few years Merryn will now make her England 7s debut and will face New Zealand, Fiji and USA on day one of the series at Starlight Stadium.

Speaking on her selection, Merryn was understandably enjoying learning from seasoned 7s players in a new environment and was looking forward to testing herself on the world stage.

"Training has been so good and all the girls and staff are great. I've enjoyed learning new skills and I love challenging myself. The camps have developed me massively as a player and a person. I'm super excited to be going to play in a World Series! It's an amazing opportunity which I'm massively grateful for and something I am really proud to be a part of."

Alongside her rugby career with the Chiefs, she is also currently a student at the University of Exeter, studying sports science.

Keeping our School Drug Free

As many parents will be aware, along with the other schools in south-east Cornwall, we have been working with Devon and Cornwall Police over the last ten years to support our drugs education programme. This has in the past involved assemblies by police officers and unannounced visits by a drugs dog and their handler to complete a sweep of the school. Over the years we have got to know Jet, a black Labrador trained as a 'passive' drugs dog, who has visited the school a number of times. Jet has now retired, but we were fortunate to be visited by Reggie last week, a beautiful spaniel trained as a 'reactive' drugs dog. Unlike Jet, who was trained to pick up the scent of illegal drugs as people walked past her, Reggie is trained to search for illegal drugs, guns and cash. On Friday, Reggie was let loose to search our corridors, toilets and a selection of classrooms to see if he could find any drugs on the premises. You'll be delighted to know that none were found.

Like Jet, Reggie's sense of smell is so good that he is able to pick up residual scents of drugs too. So, for example, if someone had been in the presence of someone else smoking cannabis the night before, Reggie would be able to smell it in their hair, on their clothes or even on their bag.

We look forward to seeing Reggie and his handler, PC Ridge, again in the future.



On a related note, we are aware of a number of incidents taking place in the local community involving young people over the past few months. We are in ongoing liaison with the local police service to support their work.

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London Democracy Trip

Just after 5.00am on Thursday 10th March, after two years of cancelled trips and events not attended, 50 students set off from the coach park for the Year 9 London Democracy trip ready for two days of jam packed activities.

After a few stop offs at motorway service stations, our first activity was the Houses of Parliament. Here students had the opportunity to tour the Parliamentary Estate and view the debates going on in the chambers. Unfortunately, we didn't get to see the Prime Minister or members of cabinet, but we briefly saw a debate on the National Shipbuilding Strategy. Worlds away from the rowdiness of Prime Minster's Questions, students commented on the calmness and politeness of the debate, as well as the language used, although some were not impressed with MPs being on their phones when in the chamber! After the tour, students took part in a workshop, introducing them to the process of campaigning and voting.

Our next activity took us to the London Central Mosque, which gave students the chance to learn about Islam and its part in British culture. Students were given a presentation, before again having a tour and further talk in the prayer hall. It must be noted how impressed staff were by the attentiveness, politeness and respect shown by all students.

The evening saw us have a meal in Frankie and Benny's, before heading off to arguably many student's favourite part of the trip, the Lyceum Theatre to watch the Lion King where students and staff had a thoroughly enjoyable time – even if (or maybe because!) Mrs Carlin did get pushed over by an elephant!

After a night's sleep typical of a school







residential (not helped by some ladybirds and an open window...) and a wonder goal scored by Mr Aird whilst waiting for the coach, we headed off to Kidzania for a 'world of work' experience. Being at the top end of the age limit, many of the usual 'we're a bit too old for this sir' comments ensued, only to see two hours later students engaged in a number of activities including presenting and producing a news bulletin, designing clothes in a fashion studio and arresting Mrs Ball as part of the police department.

No trip to London is complete without a bit of sightseeing and before heading back, students had the opportunity to see the views of London Eye, before starting the first part of our journey back to Liskeard by taking a Thames river cruise to meet up with the coach.

The staff would like to say well done to all the students involved and hope they found it as informative and enjoyable as we did.

Year 7

The end of the Spring term saw another successful month for Year 7 and marked a turning point for many of our youngest students, who have started to demonstrate the maturity, confidence, and kindness that we expect of our children here at Liskeard.

Well done to all our Year 7 pupils who won these awards. Year 10



Summer term is here now and we are on the final stages of the first year of the GCSE course. There are lots of really positive comments from members of staff on the mature attitude the students are showing towards their subjects.

With regard to the Year 10 mock exams we are working hard to prepare pupils in ways to help them cope with the pressures. On Tuesday 3rd & Friday 6th May (tutor time & P1), the Year 10 students took part in a revision session in the New Hall. The students have been provided with a folder and several revision items that can be used to create a solid foundation for revision. This included a folder, flash cards, a revision planner, a revision booklet, post-it notes and divides. In a carousel format, staff provided additional revision support that will promote learning and encourage individual academic progress. Can I please ask that you support your child through the revision process – usually a quiet space and then a discussion about what has been

Words of the Week 2021 - 2022

For a while now, we have been looking to develop a genuinely coherent approach to building students' range of vocabulary. A wide knowledge of vocabulary improves all areas of communication – listening, speaking, reading and writing.

Our Tutor programme for 2021 – 2022 includes two sessions of 'Words of the Week' each month. Each session presents three words, with definitions and activities to use them in context. Introducing our students to challenging words can help to improve their confidence to use increasingly sophisticated language in their speech and in writing.

The 'Words of the Week' activity identifies words which can be used across all subjects (known as Tier 2 words) as well as more subject specific vocabulary (known as Tier 3 words). Where it is possible, the Cornish translation is also included.

We would like to encourage the wide use of the Words of the Week outside of the classroom. Here are a few ways to get them talking:

- Have conversations about the school day, lessons, clubs, funny moments, reactions, feelings.
- Play word games, for example use the Words of the Week to create a short fictional story.
- Play 'one little word' where one person chooses a special word, (or one of the Words of the Week) gives a definition, explains or describes why it is special.
- Play 'Half a minute' where a topic is chosen, and each player must talk on that topic for 30 seconds without repetition, try to include one or more 'Words of the Week'
- Ask your child/children to talk about books they are reading at school and at home, and to give their opinion using key terminology they would use in lessons.
- Take a few minutes to look out of a window and talk about what is going on and what you can see.
- Ask your child/children to tell you the Words of the Week and how they have used them at school or elsewhere.


